THE COST OF LIVING 2022

The cost of living is something that has impacted us all this year. With petrol prices, electricity bills, and food costs rising; many families have been finding it difficult to manage. But have you ever wondered how this affects students globally? Have you ever wondered what small changes you could make to help, and how schools are aiming to help those households in desperate need? Many children across the UK have had to adapt to difficult changes. In the UK alone, close to four million children are living in poverty, where their parents are struggling to pay rent, heat their homes, and buy essential food items. In Dundee, Scotland, over a quarter of school students are living in abject poverty, and with the cost of living increasing, many will experience difficult times. Schools across the UK are providing free lunches for children, setting up clothing grants, and providing trollies packed with essential food items which students in need are able to take home. Clubs after school (such as netball, football, and cricket) are now free, as are school trips; meaning that parents and carers are able to save money. The Scottish government states: "We know this is a worrying time and we are doing everything withing our limited powers and finite budgets to help children, their parents and carers." The UK government is also providing £37 billion to help households with the greatest needs. However, not all schools are taking this amount of action. In some schools, students are being forced to have smaller lunch

portions or go without a second meal to save costs- resulting in a negative impact on health and, consequently, academic achievements. These schools do, however, have breakfast clubs set up so that these students can have a larger breakfast (mainly toast) to help sustain them throughout the day. Students globally are taking it upon themselves to do all that they can to help out with the cost of living. One primary school student in Dundee stated "...we now take the bus to school and back home so that we can save petrol/gas for emergencies and family trips". Another says she worries that "my parents won't be able to pay for my gymnastics as it is quite expensive and [they] need the money to go towards more necessary things". Many children have decided to wear jumpers at home during the colder winter months to come and sleep in more layers to save their parents having to put the heating on. Many students across the UK have also decided to walk or cycle to school instead of driving or paying bus fares. There is no denying the fact that the cost of living is increasing and will heavily impact those already living in poverty. However, by doing our bit to help, I believe that students can help parents keep the costs down. It's truly as simple as turning off the light when you're not using the room or making sure that you are not charging devices (such as phones and computers) unnecessarily.



However, like most women abducted by Boko Haram, she was rejected by her community and her and both her children were ostracised by society. However, through it all, Open Doors has worked with her and her two beautiful children to recover from her traumatic experience and strengthen her faith and trust in God. She is now thriving in a local Christian community that helps women kidnapped by Boko Haram and supports them and their young families. lianada states: "I am so grateful. Your prayers have really kept me going. I am so happy. Thank you so much. God has been with us all the while. He has protected us. You never forget me. Today (2019), you travelled to my house, just to see me and my children. I'm so grateful. May God bless you."


What is Open Doors?


